NPMS – Survival in the Wilderness with Creek Exploration (Face to Face)

Description of Seminar: Join Naturalist Lisa Sanchez at the Lancaster County Environmental Center for a day of learning to survive in the wilds of Lancaster and Lebanon counties. The important things in a survival situation are food, water, shelter, and fire; and we will explore all of these. You will have the opportunity to build a shelter and safely try a few fire-starting methods. We will gather food in the woods and determine which plants and insects are safe to eat. Because water is vital in a survival situation, we will explore what life can be found in a creek and how to determine if it is healthy to eat. What makes water safe for drinking? Bring old shoes that will allow you to jump in the Mill Creek! If you are a fan of survival shows, here is your chance to practice the skills highlighted on television while learning important things about the environment in which we live. You will also practice the vital skills of teamwork, problem solving and collaboration! Dress for a lengthy outdoor experience.

Description of Seminar: The CMU CS Academy is a project from Carnegie Mellon University's School of Computer Science which developed a novel, world-class, interactive middle- and high-school computer science curriculum. SEE students will receive coding guidance from Judy Trusz, Nonpublic Math Consultant, while connecting with other students who have similar interests and skills. Using CS0 (CS Zero) as an introduction to programming, students will learn the basics of Python by drawing images and creating animations. They can expect interactive problem solving with new friends through a graphics-based curriculum which gives everyone something of interest — from art to games to algorithms! Coding is vitally important as a new language in the digital age. Logic and math skills are developed as well as problem-solving abilities.

Can you name some of those who remain in our region, enduring the cold temperatures and change of seasons? Why do some birds migrate, and others remain? Winter brings special opportunities to learn about birds, and many people do this by feeding them each winter. During this seminar, we will talk about a number of birds who remain in Pennsylvania during the winter - their life cycle, features, habitats, and identifying characteristics. Tips will be shared on encouraging birds to nest and feed in your backyard. If you are a fan of our feathered friends, this seminar is for you! Description of Seminar: On a cold February morning, do you need an interesting reminder about why the end of winter is such a great season? Naturalist, Lisa Sanchez, is going to walk us through the fine art of maple sap collection as well as the steps and science behind turning that sap into maple syrup. We will compare how the Native Americans did this relatively simple (but painstaking) process to how it is done at Lancaster County Central Park. We'll also learn how agricultural systems make maple syrup a profitable product for the northeast United States. At this "sweet" SEE seminar, you will experience the history, tapping, collecting, boiling, finishing, and candy-making stages of maple sugaring. There will even be time for tasting a pancake or two with REAL maple syrup with lunch! We will also learn how maple sugar can be incorporated into cooking as a healthy option for refined sugar. **Bundle up** as we prepare to spend time outdoors in the Sugar Bush, using all our senses to enjoy this special winter treat.
