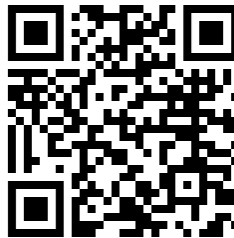

Our Classes

English as a Second Language (ESL) Classes

ESL 1 & ESL 2

Students explore the foundations of English including vocabulary, basic pronunciation skills, grammatical structures, and foundational learning strategies such as speaking to communicate information on familiar topics, active listening by using simple clarification techniques, reading texts with frequently occurring words, and developing simple writing skills.

Requirement: Placement test

ESL 3

Students increase their vocabulary, improve their pronunciation, participate in short conversations in small groups and present information to the rest of the class, develop reading fluency, and produce simple and compound sentences in writing using grammar learned in class.

Requirement: ESL 2 or appropriate placement score

ESL 4

Students increase their use and knowledge of general academic and content-specific words, such as idioms, communicate entire ideas, and understand conversations. Students will also work collaboratively on projects, give oral presentations, and develop reading strategies with the use of context clues.

Requirement: ESL 3 or appropriate placement score

ESL 5

Students will acquire and use a wide range of complex academic vocabulary, understand figurative language, idiomatic expressions, and improve their pronunciation. In this class, students will improve their communication skills, read and analyze evidence-based texts, and compose written informational texts using complex sentences. Student in this class will gain skills to help them prepare for college or career advancement.

Requirement: ESL 4 or appropriate placement score.

Our Classes

High School Equivalency (HSE)

Classes assist adults in attaining a secondary school diploma in the transition to postsecondary education and training. Coursework includes math, reading, writing, science, and social studies. Instruction will be provided to prepare students to pass both the GED and HiSET exams. Classes occur within the prisons and community settings. Customized learning options are available.

Requirement: Placement test

Family Literacy

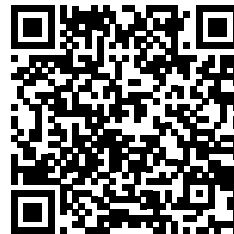
Family Literacy offers English as a Second Language (ESL) classes which help caregivers succeed in academics, work, and in the community. Parent Education supports them in their role as their child's first and most important teacher. Interactive literacy activities help caregivers to support their children's educational and developmental needs in preschool and early elementary school years.

Requirement: Caregivers of a child between ages birth through third grade, as well as a placement test

Our Classes

Workforce Preparation

Administrative Support Professional, Basic Computer Skills, Pre-LPN, Certified Nursing Assistant Training, Direct Care Provider, and Teacher Assistant Training for English Language Learners

Administrative Support Professional

Administrative skills are in high demand for jobs in virtually every industry. Learn how to transfer these skills into many occupations. Skills you will learn in this course include Microsoft Word, business phone etiquette, Zoom, Teams, and effective interviewing. Customer service skills focus on verbal and non-verbal communication, listening to the customer, customer behavior, professionalism, and conflict resolution.

Recommended: High school diploma or equivalency

Certified Nursing Assistant Training for English Language Learners

This 8 to 9-week course prepares English learners for a position as a certified nursing assistant caring for residents in skilled nursing facilities, hospitals, rehab centers, and other healthcare facilities. Participants will develop their language and workplace skills while simultaneously gaining occupational skills needed to obtain their certificate of completion from HACC. Graduates will be eligible to take the National Nurse Aid Assessment Program examination. After passing the NNAAP written and skills performance exam, the student is placed on the PA Nurse Aide Registry.



Our Classes

Workforce Preparation (Continued)

Administrative Support Professional, Basic Computer Skills, Pre-LPN, Certified Nursing Assistant Training, Direct Care Provider, and Teacher Assistant Training for English Language Learners

Direct Care Provider

Students will learn basic health care skills, including communication, personal care, and First Aid/CPR in preparation to be a direct care provider in a long-term care facility, home health setting, or a group home. Along with the health care training provided by professionals in the field, students will work on reading, writing, speaking, and listening skills, and learn how to be successful in the workplace. This 27-day class includes field trips to healthcare settings and a healthcare job fair.

Requirement: Placement test

Pre-LPN/TEAS

(Licensed Practical Nurse/Test of Essential Academic Skills)

Preparation classes help students who are planning to attend Practical Nursing school. Students will learn the study skills needed to be successful learners. The class will focus on the content and thinking skills that are required to pass the TEAS, Test of Essential Academic Skills (nursing school entrance exam).

Requirement: High school diploma, or equivalency and placement test

Teacher Assistant Training for English Language Learners

This 12-week course prepares English learners for careers in special education. Participants will develop their language skills while learning about special education classrooms in the US. The course focuses on building English proficiency, technology skills, and workplace skills for success and confidence as a teacher assistant. Class graduates are guaranteed a job interview with IU13.

Requirement: High School Diploma or equivalent (from the US or other country)

Services Provided

Refugee Center (RC)

RC focuses on aiding refugees and immigrants in Lancaster County and beyond to provide education, integration, wellness, and work leading to self-sufficiency. Services include Career Pathways for English Learners and Cultural Navigation for schools.

Career Pathways for English Learners (CPEL)

English learners work with Cultural Navigators to identify the steps needed to reclaim their careers in the U.S. Tuition support is available for eligible participants.

Cultural Navigation for Schools

Multilingual Cultural Navigators work with children and adults to connect them with social, educational, and medical opportunities that empower families.

Student Advisement

All students in our classes can receive ongoing, one-on-one support in areas such as goal setting, scheduling, referrals, career planning, and barrier and transition services.



Services Provided

Tutoring

One-to-one or small-group tutoring is provided for students who have specific learning needs or logistical barriers. Topics of instruction include reading, math, English communication, and work-based foundation skills. Please contact us if you would like to volunteer as a tutor.

Workplace Services

Through the Employer Engagement Program (EEP), IU13 and partnering agencies Church World Service and Literacy and Learning Success Centers work with employers in Lancaster, Lebanon, and Dauphin counties to create pipelines to jobs and career pathways for the successful hiring and retaining of refugees in their workplaces. The program engages employers in maximizing the skills and talents new neighbors bring to the workforce, creating opportunities for staff to improve English skills, offering employer-supported training and leadership development, and creating more diverse, equitable, and inclusive workplaces.

English as a Second Language

Targeted instruction is available to help workers with limited English language skills improve their communication skills in the workplace.

Navigation Services

Employers sometimes struggle to communicate effectively with immigrant and refugee employees and/or have challenges helping them to overcome obstacles to maintaining employment. Cultural navigators help to bridge the divide, and to support immigrants and refugees in accessing additional community resources to supplement their income.

Workplace Spanish Instruction

Training will help managers and others communicate more effectively with Spanish-speaking employees. Common workplace language is emphasized, and participants are encouraged to bring specific communication issues to class.

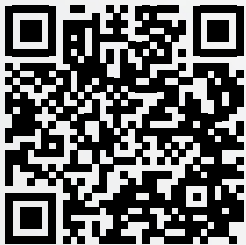
