

About the Program:

The Willow Valley Work Immersion Program (WIP) focuses on helping young adults with disabilities make a successful transition from school to productive adult life. This unique one-year immersion program serves students with disabilities who are in their last year of high school.

With the goal of competitive employment, each student receives classroom instruction and hands-on experience through internships in as many as three departments within the Willow Valley Communities. Through their work immersion experiences, students also develop employability, social, and independent living skills.

Program Eligibility:

In order to be considered for Willow Valley WIP, candidates must:

- Have completed the high school credits necessary for graduation.
- Have independent personal hygiene and grooming skills.
- Have independent daily living skills.
- Have access to independent transportation.
- Maintain appropriate behavior and social skills in the workplace.
- Be able to communicate effectively.
- Have interest in working in a retirement community setting.
- Be able to pass a criminal background check, a drug screening, have current immunizations, and meet other Willow Valley requirements.
