Description of Seminar: In 1873, Eddy, a twelve-year-old boy and his family left Cherryvale, KS, leaving behind his previous life and all that he had ever known. For two months they travelled across America, covering 700 miles. Eddy kept a journal of each day's events such as their camping spots and unique experiences, like when he saw a monkey for the first time. We will look at some of the oddities the family encountered as well as deduce what everyday life was like on the road. We'll look at Eddy's actual diary to get a sense of his writing style, how he spelled, and find out why everyone had the chills. And

we'll take a look at what his campsites look like today. Hint: there were fewer MacDonalds than you might expect.

Description of Seminar: SEE students love exploring nature at Lancaster County Central Park. With Naturalist, Lisa Sanchez, students learn while hiking, often asking questions and discussing a variety of topics while out in the woods. In addition to a rich environmental experience, there is much history to explore at the park. This seminar will offer a glimpse at the Native Americans from the Susquehannock tribe who lived in this park in the 1700s. We will visit a burial site located along Golf Road and learn how this tribe used plants and trees for food and tools. Students will also learn tracking skills and play games once enjoyed by the Native Americans. At many SEE Seminars in the park we touch on things learned from Native Americans, but this seminar will focus very specifically on many aspects of local Native American history that still impact things we do today. Please dress for an outdoor experience and be sure to wear sturdy shoes for hiking.
