Description of Seminar: Do you ever wonder about the secret lives of authors? Maybe you've wondered about where your favorite authors get their ideas, how many times they have to revise their work, or whether or not their cats are allowed to sit at the breakfast table. Author Lindsay K. Bandy will give you a sneak peek into how she creates her stories and poems, as well as what it's like to work in the publishing industry with professionals like agents, editors, cover designers, and audiobook narrators. Through interactive writing activities, students will learn how to transform an idea into a book!

Description of Seminar: On a cold March morning, do you need an interesting reminder about why winter is such a great season? Here is your chance to learn more about an agriculture product that can only be "harvested" this time of year -- maple sap. Lisa Sanchez, naturalist, is going to walk us through the fine art of maple sap collection as well as the steps and science behind turning that sap into maple syrup. We will compare how the Native Americans did this relatively simple (but pain-staking) process and how it is done at Lancaster County Central Park or in your own backyard to how agricultural systems make maple syrup a profitable product for the northeast United States. At this "sweet" SEE seminar, you will experience the history, tapping, collecting, boiling, finishing, and candy-making stages of maple sugaring. There will even be time for tasting a pancake or two with REAL maple syrup with lunch! We will also learn how maple sugar can be incorporated into cooking as a healthy option for refined sugar. Some insects help us by pollinating flowers, controlling pests, and breaking down dead plants and animals. Others can be a bit troublesome by spreading diseases, eating our plants, or invading our homes. In this presentation, we will learn about the fascinating world of insects and even see some of them up close! We'll discover different types of insects, how they live, and why they are important. Join us to find out which insects are our friends, which ones can be pests, and how learning about insects helps us live better with them.

Description of Seminar: Try your hand(s) at juggling! The art of juggling goes back many centuries, but has seen a drastic rise in complexity over the last decade largely due to the arrival of YouTube. You will learn the foundational steps of juggling; focusing on the basic three-ball pattern (the cascade), and will be introduced to a variety of juggling props. Videos will be shown to demonstrate the wide variety of artistic expression that can be achieved using juggling skills. Did you know juggling can be documented and explored using mathematical formulas? You will learn all about this logical approach to juggling, called "siteswap." In addition to practicing patterns as individuals, you will also get to try juggling with a partner or small group—that's where the joy of juggling really kicks in!

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
